



Born in France in 1941, Bernar Venet is a prominent international conceptual artist, whose works and sculptures are collected and exhibited in major museums around the world.

In 1966, Venet moved to New York where he discovered conceptual and minimalist art, centering on mathematical and structural drawings. Venet is renowned for his large-scale steel sculptures which explore form, balance and spatial perception in a constant changing environment, seen in his outdoor installation in front of the Eiffel Tower and in the middle of Park Avenue, New York.

Venet was awarded France's highest decoration, Chevalier de la Legion d'Honneur, for his enhancement to the reputation of France through arts.
